This Rand denominated global listed property equity feeder fund will, apart from assets in liquid form, consist solely of units in the approved, Catalyst Global Real Estate UCITS Fund ("underlying fund") under the MLC Global Multi Strategy UCITS Fund Plc domiciled in Ireland. The fund has a medium to long term investment horizon and has a total return objective comprising both income return and capital appreciation.

Fund Strategy

The underlying fund will seek to achieve its objective primarily through investing in global real estate securities listed on recognised exchanges around the world. These assets will consist of permitted investment in assets in liquid form and exchange rate swaps, equity securities, fixed income securities, securities in listed entities that are backed by real estate property, closed ended property companies that are involved in the developing, letting and management of properties, for the sole purpose of hedging exchange rate risk, the fund may invest in listed and unlisted financial instruments (derivatives).

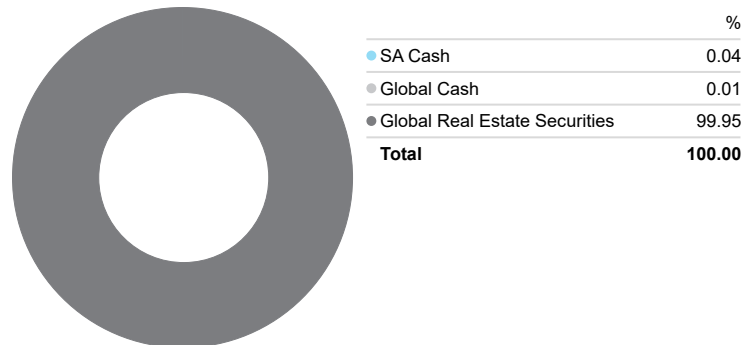
The feeder fund invests into a non-distributing fee class of the underlying fund, hence no income will be available for distribution.

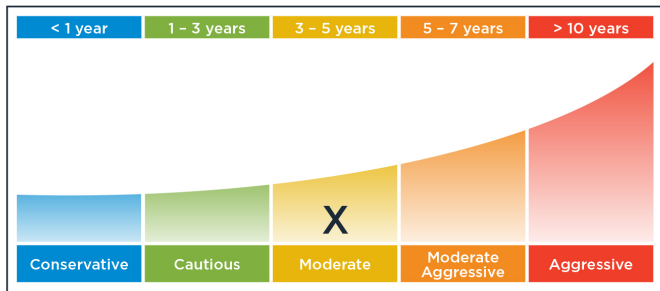

Glossary Terms

Annualised Returns

Annualised return is the weighted average compound growth rate over the period measured.

Asset Allocation

Asset allocation is the percentage holding in different asset classes (i.e. equities, bonds, property, etc.). It is used to determine the level of diversification in a portfolio.

Capital Volatility

Volatility is a measure of 'risk' and refers to the extent to which the price of an investment or capital value fluctuates over a certain period of time. Funds with high volatility usually offer the potential for higher returns over the longer term than low volatility funds.

Cumulative Returns

Cumulative return is the total growth experienced over the period measured.

Derivatives

Derivatives are instruments generally used as an instrument to protect against risk (capital losses), but can also be used for speculative purposes. Examples are futures, options and swaps.

Distributions

The income that is generated from an investment and given to investors through monthly, quarterly, biannual or annual distribution pay-outs.

Diversification

This is a strategy designed to reduce risk within a portfolio by combining a variety of investments (or asset classes) such as equities, bonds, cash or property, which are unlikely to all move in the same direction at the same time. This is designed to reduce the risk (and protect against capital losses) within a portfolio. Diversification allows for more consistent performance under a wide range of economic conditions as it smoothes out the impact of negative market events. The positive performance of some investments or asset classes should neutralize the negative performance of others.

Financial Instruments

Derivatives also known as financial instruments (such as a future, option, or warrants) whose value derives from and is dependent on the change in value of an underlying asset (such as a commodity, currency, or security) to protect against risk (capital losses).

Fund Objective

The fund objective is the portfolio's core goal.

Fund Strategy

The fund strategy is the way that the fund is managed to achieve the fund objective.

Information Ratio

The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.

LISP (Linked Investment Service Provider)

A Linked Investment Service Provider is a financial institution which packages, distributes and administers a broad range of unit trust investments.

Maximum Drawdown

The maximum drawdown measures the highest peak to trough loss experienced by the fund.

Participatory Interests

When you buy a unit trust, your money is pooled with that of many other investors. The total value of the pool of invested money in a unit trust fund is split into equal portions called participatory interests or units. When you invest your money in a unit trust, you buy a portion of the participatory interests in the total unit trust portfolio. Participatory interests are therefore the number of units that you have in a particular unit trust portfolio.

Sharpe Ratio

The Sharpe Ratio measures total risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. It measures the amount of risk associated with the returns generated by the portfolio and indicates whether a portfolio's returns are due to excessive risk or not. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been (i.e. a higher return with a contained risk profile, where the portfolio manager is not taking excessive risk to achieve those returns).

Standard Deviation

Standard deviation (also called monthly volatility) is a measure of how much returns on an investment change from month to month. It is typically used by investors to gauge the volatility expected of an

Tax Free Savings Account

Portfolio Manager Comment

Market Commentary June 2025

The fund benchmark, the FTSE EPRA/NAREIT Developed Rental Net Total Return Index, recorded a net total USD return of 0.60% for the month of June. The best performing listed real estate market was Hong Kong which recorded a total USD return of 7.81% for the month. The United States of America (US) recorded the lowest total USD return of -0.62%. Year to date (YTD), the fund benchmark has returned 4.89% in USD, and the best performing market has been Hong Kong (27.18%), whilst the US (-0.28%) has been the worst performing market.

The best performing sectors globally for the month in USD were Diversified (+5.68%), Lab Space (+5.44%), Office (+4.09%). The worst performing sectors were Data Centres (-2.94%), Single Family Housing (-2.68%), and Storage (-2.02%). Year to date, the best performing sectors globally were Student Housing (+22.07%), Diversified (+20.54%) and Health Care (+15.81%). The worst performing sectors were Lab Space (-22.60%), Hotels (-8.48%) and Data Centres (-7.01%).

The onset of the second quarter was immediately met with volatility with the Trump administration's "Liberation Day" announcements with the US imposing a minimum 10% tariff on nearly all imports and steeper "reciprocal" tariffs targeting a number of goods and trade partners. This led to notable turbulence as the aftermath created investor anxiety as reflected through a significant sell-off and subsequent recovery within general equities and listed real estate alike. The disruption brought on by the tariffs and the resulting foreign policy response and negotiations has led many investors to re-assess their evolving risk and return expectations within real estate sectors and the broader financial markets.

The US Federal Reserve (Fed) decided to hold interest rates steady during the quarter, maintaining the federal funds rate at a range of 4.25% – 4.50%, given the elevated inflation readings and concerns over import cost pressures amid the US's tariff negotiations with China, the European Union and other nations. In Europe, monetary policy took a more accommodative turn during Q2. The European Central Bank (ECB) reduced its key interest rate by 25 bps in April and again in June, bringing the deposit rate to 2.0%. This marked a cumulative 2% cut in rates since last June, which has seen Eurozone inflation readings steadily decline towards the ECB target of 2% at the end of June.

The Bank of England (BOE) cut its benchmark rate by 25 bps to 4.25% in May and held steady in its June meeting, citing uncertainty related to global trade tensions and a need for further evidence of a sustained decline in inflation. Further afield, the Bank of Japan has held its benchmark interest rate at 0.5% for the entire quarter.

The estimated forward FAD (Funds Available for Distribution) yield for the sector is 5.12% with a 4-year annual compound FAD growth of 5.05%.
